IRWMP DAC Outreach

- CRWA's support includes both onsite Technical Support and Educational training with IRWMP outreach.

Inyo-Mono Integrated Regional Water Management Planning (Inyo-Mono IRWMP)

- Conduct needs assessments in order to identify and document the most pressing water related issues.
- Assist targeted communities with creating and/or updating emergency response/drought plans.
 - Provide ongoing assistance to correct critical issues identified in the region
- Program is linked to both small water systems and tribes in Inyo-Mono Counties.

Mojave Integrated Regional Water Management Planning (Mojave IRWMP)

- Provide technical support: Menu of Services
 - Needs Assessments TMF format
 - Rate Analysis
 - Corporate Compliance Reviews
 - Drought /Water Conservation Planning
 - Energy Efficiency
 - Preliminary Engineer Pre-App and Application Funding Support
- Quarterly training on focused/requested topics
- Program is linked to 40 small water systems within the Mojave Water Agency region.

May 2016 MWA received the ACWA Claire Hill Award for the Small water systems assistance program with CRWA.

North Coast IRWMP Education Training

- Provide educational training and support with small systems in the region.
- We're continuing to pursue additional Technical Assistance opportunities in an effort to help more systems.

Tribal Statewide Program

- CRWA offers tribal-specific training and resources
- CRWA is currently assisting with the design and implementation of a Solid Waste Management program to Native American tribes.
 - CRWA is helping to develop Solid Waste Management Plans (SWMP) or helping to update tribes' current SWMP.
 - CRWA is also conducting webinars and workshops tribal specific.
 - There are 17 tribes in the SWMP program
